Culture Wars and Intercultural Competence

The mission of Divine Word College is to offer a preparation for missionary service “within an environment that teaches and honors the rich cultural diversity of the world.” For that reason, we emphasize the importance of intercultural competence as one of the five core missionary skills at DWC. As we prepare for our annual celebration of Mission Sunday, cultural diversity will take center stage. The songs, dance, clothing and food from everywhere around the world help us welcome and celebrate the extraordinary cultural diversity of the members of the DWC community. Hooray!

However, as Election Day in the USA draws near, I also note two thoughts about cultures that sometimes fade into the background.

First, *cultures change* – constantly and sometimes rapidly. We might imagine that cultures are permanent and rather unvarying. Cultures are surprisingly flexible and experience many adjustments to new realities. My personal experience of culture change in the USA has been rather dramatic.

Born in 1954, I’m old enough to remember the 1960’s and recall the Civil Rights Movement and the Peace Movement. Technology and communications advances were exploding. The music changed, the food changed, family structures, sexual customs, and gender roles were all changing. Youth culture and generation gap were phrases that indicated the growing distance between the cultures of the “greatest generation” (born in 1901-1927), the “silent generation” (1928-1945), and my own “baby boomers”(1946-1964).

US culture continued to change rapidly in the subsequent decades. During the roughly thirty years from 1975 until 2006, I spent 20 years outside of





the US. Each time I returned for a visit, I was surprised at how many things were different. Computers and internet connections came to dominate. Music and fashion were changing of course. The 9/11 terrorist attacks dominated much of public life. The child abuse scandals exploded, first for the Catholic Church and then for many other institutions. I felt a bit like an alien! In subsequent years since I've returned, immigration from Latin America and elsewhere has increased. Politics have veered from left to right to left. Religious practice has declined in many families.

Second, *culture conflict* is normal. Conflict between cultures of different nations is often a lived experience for missionaries, but internal cultural conflict is just as important. Today's passionate US politics are unfolding in the midst of a "culture war". As always, there are some people who want to move forward, some who want to remain, and some who want to go back to earlier patterns of life. But at this moment in the US, the conflict seems to go much deeper. The struggle is not principally over one policy or another – not just the usual struggle between good and bad. Our current conflict is perceived by many as a "war" between good and evil.

We cannot even agree on what is true or false. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, a US senator and diplomat, used to say "Everyone is entitled to his own opinion, but not his own facts." In the USA today, we have been introduced to the dangerous world of "alternative facts." We are still mired in arguments about whether President Obama was born in the United States, and whether President Trump won or lost the 2020 election! A mistake about facts is normal; but conscious, systematic lying and gaslighting about facts is extraordinarily dangerous territory for any culture.

Jesus lived and worked in a time of tremendous cultural upheaval. In the midst of Roman domination, he lived in Galilee, in frequent contact with Samaritans and gentiles, Further south, in Judea he was seen as a dangerous rabble-rouser. He challenged the religious leadership of his time to be more open to God's mercy and forgiveness, rather than relying too much on religious regulations. He was judged and condemned in the midst of power struggles between the Roman procurator and the high-priests of the Jerusalem Temple. Death and resurrection were the outcomes.

This week we gladly celebrate cultural diversity as part of our Mission Sunday observances. We will rejoice that people of different cultures can come together in mutual respect and unity. But we are also aware that missionary service aims at respectfully challenging cultures to become more human and more merciful. That can be a dangerous game.



Loving Beyond Cultural Boundaries

In the final decades of the 19th century, when the Society of the Divine Word was founded, nationalist and imperialist sentiments were very strong among the various European nations. Not surprisingly, such attitudes were internalized by many of our first confreres. Fr. Janssen's openness to the admission of other ethnic groups into the

Society is all the more remarkable when compared with the views prevalent in his cultural milieu.

After St. Michael's Mission House (1875), he established St. Raphael's in Rome (1888), St. Gabriel's Mission House in Vienna (1889), and Holy Cross Mission House in Nysa, Poland (1892). The Society grew rapidly, and Janssen did not allow his original plan of founding a German-Austrian-Dutch missionary seminary to prevent him from accepting candidates from outside of the German-speaking areas. At St. Gabriel's, Slavic and Hungarian candidates were accepted as well as candidates from German-speaking families of the United States and Argentina. At Holy Cross, Polish and Slovak candidates were accepted into the community. However, all of these young men were admitted to German-speaking seminaries and were thus acculturated into the larger community.

The breadth of the Founder's love for all peoples was not lost on the young members of the Society. A young frater, Teodor Drapiewski SVD, recalled the conferences that Fr. Janssen gave to the students at St. Gabriel's. This young confrere, who would later give his life in Dachau, was greatly impressed with the concern that Fr. Janssen had for Polish emigrants to Latin America. He wrote, "(Fr. General's) love of neighbor embraced all the nations of the world."

The appropriate respect for each individual and for each one's culture became an important theme in Fr. Janssen's conferences for the students. P. Joseph Marianski SVD, a Polish confrere who worked in Argentina until 1932, remembered:

"The majority of the seminarians at St. Gabriel's from eastern Europe were of Polish descent and were often the butt of the jokes of their western confreres. Although our Father Founder was also from the West he had no prejudices. In the Rule he had composed, as well as in his conferences, he forbade that disparaging remarks be made about any nation. On one occasion... he said: 'It is not enough to have mission spirit and to work zealously in the missions; one must also love the people one finds there....' 'Go into the whole world and teach all nations.' That was our commission. We can never accomplish it if we do not 'love and respect the people.' Such was our Founder. He thought like a Christian, a Catholic, a supra-nationalist, because that was how he felt."

Higher Learning Commission

HLC Assessment Academy Graduation

This week, Dr. Cathleen Cleary, Ms. Kimberly Burnett-Hackbarth, and Dr. Joshua Young will represent Divine Word College at the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) Assessment Academy. The Assessment Academy is a special program offered by the HLC to train institutions in how to improve their assessment efforts. As part of the college's participation in the Academy, DWC developed a detailed assessment plan, tested and revised the plan, and established assessment goals. Our progress was monitored by an HLC mentor, who noted DWC could be used as an effective model of quality assessment during our mid-point check in. As our work with the HLC Assessment Academy comes to a close, we have learned a few important lessons; 1) assessment helps colleges focus on what they are really trying to teach; 2) assessment data can reveal what a college is doing well on and what it can improve upon; and 3) assessment must be intentional and needs to be a part of the college's strategic planning. Please pray for the DWC representatives that will share our experiences and these lessons with other HLC institutions.

HLC Criterion 2- Acting with Integrity and Conducting Ourselves Ethically

In a previous issue of the LOG, I detailed the first criterion of being accredited by the Higher Learning Commission (HLC). Today, I wish to touch on criterion two which states, "in fulfilling its mission, the institution acts with integrity; its conduct is ethical and responsible." There are two significant commitments the college must meet. First, that the decisions the college makes are collaborative across our governing mechanisms and that the process to reach those decisions is fairly transparent and without conflicts of interest. This approach to institutional leadership is already inherent in the way the Church approaches community life in religious communities, specifically as communities act for the common good of the community and recognize each individual's freedom to participate willingly and knowingly.

The second commitment of the college extending from criterion two is the college's commitment to academic freedom, freedom of expression, and acquisition of knowledge. Specifically, HLC wants to make sure that professors and students can engage in pursuing answers to difficult questions that can often seem politically controversial if it can advance knowledge and build understanding. HLC also hopes that any research being conducted is done in a way that is ethically acceptable based on higher education research standards. This means that the college has an institutional review board that reviews research being conducted on human subjects, including students. While not a lot of human subject research is done at DWC, the institutional review board is an important element in maintaining human dignity for research participants.



Assessment Bites by Dr. Yasmin Rioux

What is the difference between summative and formative assessment?

Summative assessment is a process of assessment that measures the student's/students' overall learning experience (skills, comprehension, knowledge, etc.) at the end of a course, intervention, or program. This type of assessment is useful for curricular improvements.

Formative assessment is a process of assessment that measures the student's/students' comprehension or ability to perform a task throughout a course, intervention, or program in order to gain an understanding of how a student or group is doing while they are presently taking part in an educational lesson or method of instruction. This type of assessment is also useful for course or curricular improvements.

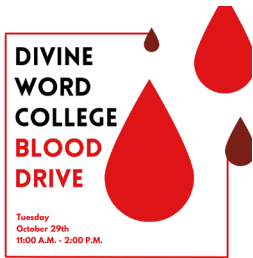
