MAGA - What is Greatness?

One of the Super Bowl commercials caught my attention. It poses the question: What is Greatness? Without a doubt, it is intended as a commentary on the slogan of President Trump's administration: Make America Great Again.

The background music features Johnny Cash singing a song from 1990 – <u>Depeche Mode's "Personal Jesus."</u> The still images of the commercial show people reaching out to folks who are in need.

The closing screen of the commercial states simply: **Jesus showed us** what greatness really is. How do you think Jesus showed true greatness?

For me, a missionary, I especially see greatness in the ways that Jesus reached out in friendship to those who were not from his home town, or even from his own people. I think of four of the most remarkable moments: the amazed Samaritan woman at Jacob's well, the faith-filled Roman centurion in Capernaum, the Samaritan leper returning to give thanks, and the pagan Syrophoenician woman insistently begging for her daughter to be healed. Jesus also taught others to reach out beyond the boundaries of family and nation. In response to a question, "who is my neighbor?" he told the amazing story of the Good Samaritan who went out of his way to help a victim of assault and robbery.

Recently, Vice President J.D. Vance spoke about how Christian love should be expressed. Citing his understanding of St. Augustine's idea of *ordo amoris*, or "rightly ordered love," he said: "You love your family and then you love your neighbor, and then you love your community, and then you love your fellow citizens in your own country, and then after that, you can focus [on] and prioritize the rest of the world. A lot of the far left has completely inverted that." He further commented: "They seem to hate the citizens of their own country and care more about people outside their own borders.... Your compassion belongs first to your fellow citizens."

Putting aside Vance's rhetorical flourish about hating one's fellow citizens, does it seem to you that Vance may be trying to limit charity rather than to organize it? A contemporary proverb says, "Charity starts at home." But, as a nation, we might be in danger of turning that wisdom into, "Charity stays at home." St. Thomas Aquinas commented on whether our care for others should be limited to one's own family and people. He wrote:



"[W]e ought in preference to bestow on each one such benefits as pertain to the matter in which, speaking simply, he is most closely connected with us, and yet this may vary according to the various requirements of time, place, or matter in hand: Because *in certain cases one ought, for instance, to succor a stranger, in extreme necessity, rather than one's own father,* if he is not in such urgent need." (Summa, Part II-II, q. 31.3)

All people are called to share in the greatness of God. I am wondering about how those of us who live in the United States can share in divine greatness? To put it another way, how can we help *Make America Great Again?* Perhaps we can concentrate on some alternative slogans – Make America *Grateful* Again! Make America *Generous* again! Make America *Gracious* again! Surely, they lead to greatness.

Augustine himself added: "You are all looking forward to greeting Christ seated in heaven. Attend to him lying under the arches, attend to him hungry, attend to him shivering with cold, attend to him needy, attend to him a foreigner." (Sermon 25,8)






Divine Word College Green Initiatives Update

Divine Word has made significant progress with our Green Initiatives in recent years, and I am pleased to report on our progress and future plans.

Past Initiatives:

We have successfully implemented several key initiatives that have positively impacted our environmental footprint. These include:

- Conversion of all lighting fixtures to energy-efficient LED technology.
- Replacement of the roof with a more energy-efficient material.
- Installation of A/C split units, allowing for more localized and efficient temperature control.





- Purchase of hybrid vehicles for college use.
- Implementation of food waste reduction programs. (encore dishes and recycling oils)
- Consistent recycling of cans and bottles.
- Recycling of used batteries.
- Robust recycling programs for aluminum, paper and cardboard.

Present and Future Initiatives:

Building on these successes, we are currently focused on the following initiatives:

- **Boiler Efficiency:** We are exploring options to improve the efficiency of our boiler system to reduce both energy consumption and greenhouse gas emissions.
- **Air Economizers:** We are investigating the feasibility of installing air economizers to optimize our HVAC systems and further reduce energy usage while improving air quality.
- **Two-Cycle Motor Reduction:** We are actively working to replace two-cycle motors with electric alternatives, reducing air pollution and noise.
- Hybrid Vehicle Fleet Expansion: We plan to continue our transition to a more fuel-efficient fleet by purchasing new hybrid vehicles as replacements become necessary.



Looking ahead, we are committed to expanding our green initiatives with the following focus areas:


- **Air Travel Alternatives:** We will explore and promote alternatives to air travel for college-related business, leveraging video conferencing and other technologies to minimize our carbon footprint. These may include car-pooling and travel by rail.
- **Wood Chipping vs. Burning:** We are transitioning from burning wood to chipping it for mulch and other uses, reducing air pollution and creating valuable resources.
- Enhanced Electronic Recycling: We will expand our electronic recycling program to encompass a wider range of devices and materials, ensuring responsible disposal and resource recovery.
- Plant-Based Food Consumption: We will encourage and increase the amount of plant-based foods offered in the dining facility. Consuming a plant-based diet is a healthier, more cost-effective choice, and reduces the environmental impact associated with meat production.

I am confident that these ongoing and future initiatives will further solidify Divine Word College's commitment to environmental stewardship and contribute to a more sustainable future. I welcome your feedback and support as we continue to advance our Green Initiatives.




Franciscan Voice Podcast: Honoring Black Catholic History








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FROM COMPLEX TRAUMA

Black History Month Library Display

In the United States, February is Black History Month (BHM). On February 10, 1976, President Gerald R. Ford issued a proclamation recognizing BHM for the first time. Every year since then, the sitting President has officially recognized February as Black History Month. The origin of BHM stems from the work of historian, author, and activist Dr. Carter G. Woodson, who introduced "Negro History Week" in 1926. He chose the month of February to honor the birthdays of two prominent abolitionists: Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln.
