The Wearing of the PINK!

Two weeks ago we were wearing the GREEN to celebrate St. Patrick and his adopted land of Ireland. This week, PINK is the color! The fourth Sunday in Lent is memorable for the "rose" colored vestments. The Mass opens with the traditional phrase: Laetare Jerusalem, "Rejoice, O Jerusalem." Pink/rose is the liturgical color for rejoicing. We are already halfway through our purple Lenten journey.

Fr. Adam Oleszczuk SVD, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and the Provincial of the Chicago Province of Divine Word Missionaries, was the celebrant in the DWC Chapel on Sunday. The SVD candidates, novices and juniors were gathered at DWC for a weekend celebration of SVD Formation. Adam, resplendent in a "rose" vestment, brought plenty of joy in his reflection on the Gospel story of the Prodigal Son and the Forgiving Father. I carried away four ideas from the celebration.



Keep Forgiving. The father in Jesus' story was a champion forgiver. He was longing for the return of his wayward son, and he rushed forward to embrace his son, forgiving all of the mischief and irresponsibility that he had shown. How often should we forgive? Jesus said seventy times seven. I feel both challenged and encouraged to keep on asking for forgiveness and to forgive readily.

Come to the Feast. The older brother in Jesus' story was very unhappy about the abundant forgiveness offered to his younger brother. Jealousy and resentment of his irresponsible and disrespectful little brother invaded his heart. The opening prayer for





the Mass had this to say: "...hasten toward the solemn celebrations to come." Jealousy and anger make very sad traveling companions. I am reminded to loosen up; to "waste" more time with brothers and sisters and friends.

Mothering Sunday. At one point, Fr. Adam wondered, where is the mother in this story? Perhaps she was preparing the meal! Fr. Adam probably wasn't aware that during the Middle Ages (and still today in Great Britain and in some parts of the Commonwealth) the fourth Sunday of Lent was celebrated as mothering Sunday. It is somewhat akin to Mother's Day in the USA; however in Britain it is a day to visit the Church in which one was baptized, or one's parish Church or the Cathedral. The opening antiphon of Laetare Sunday reminds us to *rejoice with Jerusalem*, the mother city of the dawning of the Kingdom of God, and to *exult and be glad at her consoling breast*. This week it would be good to keep in mind all the communities of faith that have mothered us and helped us prepare for the Eternal Paschal feast.

Pink Sisters. During Lent, our dining room tables are dressed in shades of purple, but for this week several of the tables are sporting pink tablecloths. Whenever we have a "pink" Sunday – Gaudete in Advent and Laetare in Lent – I can't help but remember our Sisters, Servants of the Holy Spirit of Perpetual Adoration (SSpSAP). When you visit them, you will learn that they can be an amazingly joyful group. Wear something PINK, proudly and full of joy!



150 Years - The Pink Sisters Foundation

As we celebrate the 150th anniversary of the foundation of the Society of the Divine Word, we are also remembering the foundation of the wider Arnoldus Family.

The Sister Servants of the Holy Spirit of Perpetual Adoration (SSpSAP) are also known as the Holy Spirit Adoration Sisters. Together with the Holy Spirit Missionary Sisters (SSpS), and the Society of the Divine Word (SVD), they form the Arnoldus Family of missionary congregations. The Adoration Sisters are known affectionately by the color of their habit: they are the Pink Sisters.

Who chose pink for the SSpSAP? Apparently, it was Arnold Janssen himself. Already in 1890, when he was preparing the Rule for the Holy Spirit Sisters, he noted there would be both active missionary Sisters with a blue habit and cloistered Sisters with a pink habit (Bornemann, 1975, p. 231). The "Blue" Sisters were established in 1891 and the "Pink" sisters in 1896. Their rose-colored tunics are worn when they are in their cloister. Outside they wear a gray habit. Janssen chose the color because it represents the joy and hope of the Holy Spirit.

The website of the SSpSAP Convent of Divine Love in Philadelphia, PA shares the following information:

"Seeing the need not only for missionary priests and brothers but also for missionary women, Saint Arnold founded the Mission Congregation of the Servants of the Holy Spirit. He further saw the need for a third missionary Congregation, to support through prayer and sacrifice the work of his first two foundations. For this, he envisioned a strictly cloistered contemplative community with perpetual adoration and founded the Sister-Servants of the Holy Spirit of Perpetual Adoration, more commonly known as the Holy Spirit Adoration Sisters. He chose the first members of this foundation from among the members of the active missionary Congregation of the Servants of the Holy Spirit who had volunteered for this branch.







"With God's blessing, the Holy Spirit Adoration Sisters took root and began to flourish. It started modestly in 1896 in a separate wing of the missionary Sister's Sacred Heart Convent, then in 1904 also in a separate wing in their newly built Motherhouse. By 1914, through the efforts of (the co-foundress), Mother Mary Michael, the cloistered Sisters could have a separate Motherhouse of their own, Holy Spirit Convent, which still exists today in its original structure.

"By 1915, Mother Mary Michael was able to found our first convent after the Motherhouse, the Convent of Divine Love in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This foundation came about through an invitation from Archbishop Edmund Francis Prendergast, who desired to have an adoration convent in his archdiocese. A wealthy Catholic layman, Cornelius A. Lane, had bequeathed a generous sum to the archdiocese for the establishment of an adoration convent. Thus the archbishop was in a position to make a generous offer. He would purchase a suitable piece of property, build and furnish a chapel and convent for the Sisters, and could promise to contribute to their support. It was a very favorable offer, which the Congregation could gratefully accept.

"In 1915, nine Sisters were sent from Steyl for the first community. Some American women soon applied and were admitted. This necessitated the establishment of a novitiate in the new convent. Several years ago, the novitiate was moved to our convent in St. Louis (Mount Grace Convent), where candidates from all parts of the United States are admitted and trained. Since its earliest years, the Sisters have kept adoration day and night before the Blessed Sacrament, and the people of Philadelphia have very frequently made visits to the chapel, joining the Sisters in prayerful vigil.

"In the course of time, more and more adoration convents would be founded by Mother Mary Michael, and after her death by her successors. At present our international religious congregation has 22 Houses in 12 countries and about 420 members in all.

"You can find our Houses in Argentina, Brazil, Germany, India, Indonesia, the Netherlands, the Philippines, Poland, Slovakia, Togo, Chile, and the United States of America." (https://adorationsisters.org/)

Missio Dei- Conference Summary

The Missio Dei Conference was a great success. The three day conference began with an address by Cardinal Antonio Tagle, Prefect of the Dicastry for Evangelization. Cardinal Tagle reminded audience members of Pope Francis's call to missionary discipleship before congratulating the Society of the Divine Word on their 150th anniversary and blessing conference participants. The first day theme was "healing wounds" and featured a keynote by Fr. Stephen Bevans, SVD, on dialogue as a key element in healing. The second day focused on the challenges of postmodernism in missionary efforts. The final day encouraged conference participants to embrace interculturality, with a keynote by Fr. Roger Shroeder presenting resources for understanding this concept as developed by the Arnoldus Family Mission. Proceeds of the conference will be published in the future and some presentations are available through SVDMissionTV on YouTube.

While at the conference, I had the opportunity to meet with Fr. Augustin Pushpa Anbu, SVD, Generalate Formation and Education Secretary. We discussed the work being done at DWC and the important relationship between the College and the Generalate. We have committed to working together to find opportunities to grow our relationship and providing opportunities for DWC community members to connect to the global Arnoldus Family educational mission. Overall, it was important that DWC be present for this important dialogue about the future of mission. I look forward to continuing the conversation from the conference to campus.



- We received a significant book donation from the Carmelite Sisters, who now reside at The Canticle in Clinton, Iowa.




Returns and Renewals

Dubuque County Reads Author Visit Event



The first wonderful thing that left an impression on me was the care of Father Binh and Father Son Le. Usually, when coming to a completely new place, meeting people you have never



met before, people will feel uncomfortable because of many strange things. I am no exception. I was also a bit worried because I did not know the two priests before, and I had never been to this parish before. However, all my worries were gone because of the hospitality of the two priests. The two priests were like older brothers welcoming their younger siblings home. This made me think more about the community life of the SVD that I am pursuing. Indeed, I experienced it through my own experience.

Another thing that left an impression on me was the experience of parish activities. During my days at the parish, I had the opportunity to attend Mass with the parishioners, visit some

families in the parish, attend funerals and encourage the bereaved families, and learn pastoral experiences from the priests. It helped me learn how the priests serve and live in relationship with the parishioners, something I had only learned from books before.







I also had the opportunity to help the priests clean the yard and repaint the doors. Therefore, when I was assigned the task, I thought I had completed it well. I was also very happy because I could contribute a little bit of my strength to serve God's house. This reminds me that: When I learn a lot, I will be able to help the Church a lot. Therefore, I will try to study well with the ability that God has given me to serve Him.

I am also quite impressed with the community of SSpsAp nuns in St Louis. Father Binh took me to visit the community of nuns here. I experienced the sacredness that the nuns gave to God when they adored the Blessed Sacrament. I also spent a few minutes praying with the nuns. This sacred act is like a reminder to me of the importance of prayer life.

Only a short week at the parish, but I have learned many useful things for my religious journey. May God, through the intercession of Mother Mary, grant the two priests and the parishioners here peace and always live in God's grace.

Spring Break Reflection: Our Lady of Africa

For the Spring Break, from March 7 to March 14, Frt. Kun Liu and myself visited Our Lady of Africa Parish in the South Side of Chicago. We stayed with the Pastor, Fr. Carl Gales SVD, at the Rectory.
