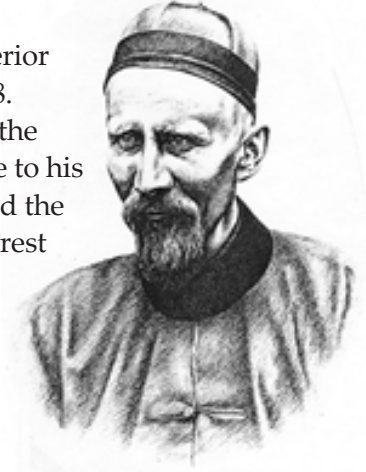

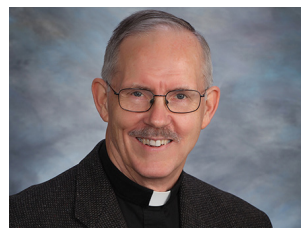
Celebrate with St. Joseph Freinademetz

The SVDs started the process of selecting a Provincial Superior for 2020-2023. We have already sent in a nomination ballot for the Provincial and Council, and there will be two more ballots in the coming months. The final decisions are made in Rome by our Superior General and the General Council. The appointments will be known by mid-April.

St. Joseph Freinademetz served as provincial superior in China from 1900 until his death in January 1908. Fr. Joseph was famous for his desire to be among the Chinese people of South Shantung. He once wrote to his family in the Austro-Italian Alps, "I love China and the Chinese. I want to die among them and be laid to rest among them." His great love is what made him a great missionary.



St. Joseph was also well known for his joyful good humor, kindly demeanor, hard work, prayerful life and commitment to caring for other SVD missionaries. He was loved by the other members of the Society who looked to him for fatherly support and encouragement. To this day he is an excellent model for all SVD provincials! After serving as provincial for six years, he wrote to St. Arnold to request that a replacement be named. He wrote, "I seem to lack all the qualities a superior should have to keep the ship afloat. For example, I lack understanding, energy, virtue, love and courage, a way with words." Fr. Arnold wrote back to assure Joseph that he had great confidence in him. He added, "I cannot at present honor your request to be freed from your office of superior. If God wants this he will have to indicate it more clearly." (Thirteen months later Fr. Joseph died in a typhus epidemic.)



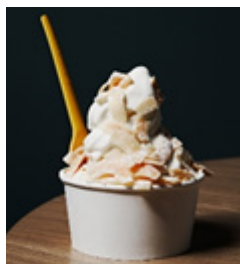
As provincial, Fr. Joseph called the confreres together to the central house in Taikia (Daijia) for an annual renewal course. The missionaries would travel quite a distance to share a month of recreation, prayer and study. Freinademetz often

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insisted that good food, some good beer, good company, a time for prayer and study were what was needed to help restore the body, mind and soul of the missionaries.

I think Father Joseph would be happy with the way we are preparing young missionaries here at Divine Word College. We are faithful in prayer, diligent in study, and we know how to party! For a missionary, joyful celebration is as important as study and prayer.

All of our major annual celebrations, Guadalupe, Lunar New Year and St. Josephine Bakhita, Family Feast, Mission Sunday and Holy Week, help to



form us into a joyful and hope-filled college. Tomorrow, on the feast of St. Joseph Freinademetz, you may have an opportunity to lift up a bottle of Tsingtao beer or to dive into a bowl of ice cream. Fr. Joseph certainly lifted a glass of that same Tsingtao beer and he may have known the delights of Chinese ice cream. Let us remember him and be grateful for his remarkable missionary service. Let us also toast our own provincial superiors scattered around the globe.

Part One of the In-Service—“Learning How to Think: Teaching Reasoning, Problem Solving, and Critical Thinking Skills” – will be conducted by Dr. Mark Taylor. Though critical thinking is espoused as a desired outcome of most college classes and of most instructors, according to employers it is rarely evident in graduates. Many faculty report limited understanding of what critical thinking actually is so they may be unaware of how to lead students to and to measure meaningful critical thinking outcomes. Real critical thinking is a complex process and requires the disciplined application of reasoning and problem solving skills, data interpretation, bias and assumption identification, predicting skills and self-monitoring. In college classes critical thinking may only follow students’ learning a range of requisite thinking and self-knowing skills. This program will help instructors across disciplines better understand how to help their students develop reasoning, problem solving and critical thinking skills to better prepare them for the workplace, civic engagement and a variety of adult roles.

Part Two of the In-Service—“Academic Advising in Populi” – will be conducted by Ms. Kimberly Burnett-Hackbarth, DWC Registrar. In this mini-workshop, Ms. Burnett-Hackbarth will familiarize new and returning faculty to the joys of student academic advising within Populi. Participants will learn how to more effectively fulfill their advising responsibilities by utilizing functions such as: the advisor tab, activity feed, transcripts, flags and flag thresholds, degree audits, and registration.

All full-time faculty are required to participate in this Faculty In-Service; adjunct/part-time faculty are welcome, but not required, to attend. If for some reason you are unable to attend, kindly notify the VP for Academic Affairs in advance by email at jszukalski@dwci.edu.

Divine Word College Presidential Scholarship

Application deadline is this Friday! Students at colleges all over the world look for scholarships to help them cover expenses related to their education—even at seminaries! Students at Divine Word College are no different. Here is a scholarship opportunity that is available to all Divine Word College students who meet the criteria.

Divine Word College first awarded the Presidential Scholarship in 1979. This scholarship is an award to applicants who show superior academic achievement. The Presidential Scholarship is an annual award of \$3,000; it is renewable each year provided the recipient continues to meet the established guidelines. Generally, this award is limited to two (2) each year—there is one scholarship still available for the current academic year.



Criteria for Selection:

New students admitted to the College Program (undergraduate program) at Divine Word College are eligible to apply provided they meet the following criteria:

- Applicants from high school must have a cumulative GPA of 3.50 or above.
- College transfer applicants must have a cumulative college GPA of 3.50 or above.
- Applicants who completed secondary school or college/university studies abroad must have an acceptable equivalent cumulative GPA.

- After the first semester at Divine Word College in the undergraduate program, students who are on the Dean's list may apply.
- Applicants from the DWC English Language Institute may apply when they transition to the undergraduate program. They must have a 3.50 high school GPA (or equivalent) or a college GPA of 3.50. A letter of recommendation is required from the Director of the DWC Intensive English Language Institute.

If you believe you qualify for the DWC Presidential Scholarship, please complete the application form by January 31, which you can obtain from Ms. Carolyn Waechter, the Financial Aid Coordinator. Carolyn can also answer any of your questions.

Another Scholarship Opportunity: Dangers of Vaping Scholarship
